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Are We Forgetting "The Millions Who Still Don't Know"?

I have never attended one of the General Service Conferences, which are held in New York each Spring, but I have been privileged to observe how much these Conferences have contributed to our Third Legacy of Service. I was a member of one of the first State Committees, and therefore received all essential information about the need of such a Conference from the Alcoholic Foundation, as well as first-hand reports from our own State Delegate. Our present Delegate, a very close friend of mine, has added greatly to my understanding of the value of the Conferences. So I know now, as many of you do, that the Conference is our democratic way of expressing our fellowship-opinion on AA matters so that our Foundation Trustees, our General Service Headquarters, and our Grapevine staff will always have "grass roots" guidance on their ever-expanding efforts to do worldwide Twelfth Step work. Perhaps I take it for granted—because I, too, owe so much to AA—that these Delegates from all the states and Canadian provinces would naturally be willing to devote much time and effort to Conference matters. However, I am puzzled as to why we make it necessary for them, and our state and provincial Committeemen, to work so hard to secure funds to pay the expenses of the very Conferences we ask our Delegates to attend. Surely, as the fourth Conference will be held in April, we must all know by now that it is hoped that each group will contribute \$10, or \$5 if the group is a small one and can afford it, to defray the expenses of the Conference. Yet, despite the fact that we are all on notice, I believe that only about twenty-five per cent of all U.S. and Canadian groups contributed to the General Service Conferences in 1953. What is the answer? Is it because our group secretaries are failing to bring the need to the attention of their groups? There is a lot of evidence to suggest that is one of the sad answers. Most of us need a little prodding and so, if our group secretary doesn't pass the hat our group contribution just doesn't get sent along. Of course, there's the ever-ready answer that many of us get pretty tight with a buck as soon as we get sober but surely we all have so much to be grateful for that we'll gladly ante up the price of a drink to give our General Service Headquarters the assistance it seeks from our Delegates-in-Conference. I wonder, then, if too many of us are thinking of the Conference as an end in itself and therefore don't see any need of helping pay the bill. Perhaps many of us who used to attend various conferences when we were drinking, have decided that conferences are only for the pleasure of

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A VISIT TO MY OFFICE

When my husband and I decided to plan a weekend trip to New York, the first thing I thought of was "Broadway." However, he mentioned visiting the General Service Office. I've got to admit that the idea of visiting GSO did not thrill me. I rather thought that sort of thing was for the real "fanatics" in AA. My motive in organizing the visit falls into the trying-to-be-perfect-wife category. But organize I did, by calling GSO and finding out that not only could we get a tour of the offices, but also an AA meeting (every Friday at 11:00 am for staff and visitors). Mustering up as much enthusiasm as I could, and feeling slightly guilty about not having a great deal of it, I arrived at GSO with my husband, ready for what I anticipated to be one more boring tour of an impersonal office building. My less zealous attitude didn't change immediately. It was sort of like what happens to me whenever I attend an AA meeting feeling "low" or reluctant. It was a gradual warming and opening up process. There were several other AA's from different parts of the country on the tour with us, so the tour had the same kind of camaraderie that I feel in the rooms. Margie, our nonalcoholic tour leader, seemed to genuinely enjoy showing us around and explaining the various operations to us. Almost at the end of the tour, we met the person whose responsibility is the financial management. One of the other AA's asked him: "How are we doing?" It was at this point that it dawned on me that I wasn't in just another impersonal office building. I was in the General Service Office of the Fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous, and I, in my small way, contribute to helping it keep going. I belong! Suddenly, I had a new appreciation and understanding of the Seventh Tradition. My thinking, prior to this experience, had not gone beyond the local level. Crazy as it may sound, I must have thought that GSO took care of itself. Yet with this new awareness, I began to remember all the information my home group's GSR had shared with us...It had new a meaning. Our visit to GSO came to a memorable close with the AA meeting. There are eleven staff positions at GSO that must be filled by AA members, and most of these attended the meeting. The rest of us were AA's from the tour and a few visiting AA's. By the time the last person spoke, a man with forty-two years of sobriety, unenthusiastic me was moved to tears—full of gratitude to be fortunate enough to be sober and part of our magnificent Fellowship.

A motion was made to approve the Minutes, all were in favor. Diana H. was out sick so Tim was asked to give the Treasurer's Report. After the report, a motion was made to accept the report. All were in favor. Rick D. had a question concerning the Anniversary Dinner, wondering if the price was too high and that was why we didn't have the turn out that had been expected. Several different reasons for the low attendance were tossed around. A new Board Member Willow arrived and was introduced to the Board. In Old Business, Cindy H. asked if it had to be a Board Member only who headed up the Anniversary Dinner and it was noted that it could really be anyone from the Board or Council who took on those responsibilities. As long as it was in-house, it was okay. Danielle E. noted that the Tampa Bay Young People's Group had given her \$45.01 from a basket being passed around to donate to the Anniversary Dinner. In New Business the main topic was the Office Manager's Evaluation and the rate increase in his Health Insurance. In the Personnel Policy it states that: "The Board Chairperson and an ad hoc committee of two (2) Board Members are responsible for performing an annual written evaluation of the Office Manager in February of each year and presenting the results of the evaluation to the Board Members for consideration and review. The Board Members will look at the increase in the Health Insurance premium as soon as it is received and at that same time any wage considerations will be reviewed. Any changes are to be made effective April 1st. any pay increase is to be made only after the new Health Insurance premium has been received and if the Budget will allow an increased amount. The Board Members shall have the right to grant other increases from time to time should it consider it necessary to do so, after consulting with the Accountant and the financial statements." A motion was made to go ahead and pay the full premium now and the Chairperson and two Board Members would get together soon to do the evaluation. On a sad note, Molly J. announced that she resigning from her position

as a Board Member because she was moving out of town. She will be missed not only here but also at the District 2 Meetings. Thanks for all your years of Service, Molly. In the Council Meeting we were introduced to some new Council Members. SOBERSTOCK 2010

Soberstock is a 3 day event in Odessa, Florida which took place this past March 19th-21st, 2010 in Odessa which is actually a small town located northwest of Tampa. It is slightly remote, yet still within a 15 minute drive to Tampa for your convenience. Soberstock has speakers from A. A. during the weekend and "open" meetings throughout the weekend. In addition to AA speakers, they also have live music from several bands on the west side of the camp. This area can hold 2000 people comfortably. The music is usually all different styles from recovery-based music to classic rock, blues, metal, country, folk & more. SoberStock is open to all A.A.'s and their families/friends. However, in accordance with the 7th tradition, they do not accept outside contributions, so they ask that only AA members purchase tickets. You are welcome to bring children with you, however, you are asked that you not bring them into the meetings unless you are able to keep them quiet as a courtesy to others. There is fishing with a valid fishing license, soccer, volleyball, football and much more, so there are plenty of things to do. The food served at Soberstock is basic "Campground" style eats. Hot Dogs, Hamburgers, etc. But you do get a breakfast, a lunch and a dinner as each days calls for. When I got there, there were already a few hundred people who had arrived with dozens of tents already set up and more coming in. The weather that Friday and Saturday was fantastic! Sunday we got showers on and off through-out the day. Even that seemed to have a healing, cleansing effect added to the awesomeness of the spirit of the weekend. By Saturday evening there must have been over 600 people who had come through Soberstock to enjoy the weather, the Fellowship and the Music. I got to see and share recovery with a lot of my old friends that I hadn’t seen in awhile and I had the opportunity to make new friends. All the speakers were from South Carolina, both husband and wives, sponsor and sponsee. They were truly an AA family in the most literal sense of the word. Talk about having a “spiritual experience”. It was great! As my one of my sponsors (who has passed on to that meeting in the sky) used to say; “ ***If you ain’t fired up bout AA, your woods all wet!***” It was that kind of weekend. For those who missed it this year because you didn’t have the money...well, you 300 plus days to save up for next years event. For those who think you’re too old or it’s a young persons event...I’ll be 60 this year and I’ll be at Soberstock next year. It’s great exercise, it’s lots of fresh air, it’s fun, it’s Fellowship and downright good time. It’s an experience you must not miss.....and you got 300 plus days to prepare for the next one. All proceeds, except the monies used to pay the bills and seed the next event, go to the Tampa Bay Area Institutions Committee up to \$2000.00. Any monies after that are divided up and send to the different AA service entities.
