SOBRIETY TO GO

IN SEARCH OF EMOTIONAL SOBRIETY

As often happens, we learn most in AA from listening to our newer members, and my home group recently experienced a new dimension of the Fifth Tradition because of it. We have a periodic group inventory, every four to six months, so that we can stay healthy as a group. We use the Traditions as well as some of the questions from the "AA Group' pamphlet as our guide. We pick a separate night and spend three to four hours checking our group pulse. At one of these inventory sessions, we had gotten to the Fifth Tradition when a member who had been with us for five months or so spoke up. "I am confused," he said. "This Tradition says that "Each group has one primary purpose-to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.' He paused a moment, then hesitantly said, "I have been attending this group recently for five months now, and we have never left this room!" The result of this new member's wisdom and willingness to participate is that our group now sponsors a weekly meeting at a local treatment center. We carry our format and our group's message to them. From this weekly Twelfth Step activity, our group has grown as some of the alcoholics in the treatment center join with us when they leave treatment. Our group has benefited in several ways other than new members. For a while, we saw an influx of non-alcoholics into the AA groups. Many of these came to us from treatment, having been told to just go to AA by well-meaning professionals who were not really familiar with what AA did and did not do. We have learned that we were at fault when this happened. If we do not show up to explain AA to new people, they will hear about it from people who do not know about AA. This simple activity of carrying the message out of our meeting room also answered another problem we were having. Those of us who have been blessed by being in AA when there were plenty of "live" Twelfth Step calls talk a lot about them. Our younger members now have an inexhaustible supply of "live" Twelfth Step calls. By regularly showing up at the treatment center in the spirit of cooperation, we are getting to know the professionals who do deal with problems other than alcohol. When someone shows up at our group who needs help of a different kind from that which we deliver, we can direct them to a person who can help, rather than just throwing them into the winds. This helps us in our effort to stick to our primary purpose, helping alcoholics achieve and maintain sobriety. By being willing to stick close to our primary purpose, by being willing to actually carry the message physically out of our meeting space, we as a group have made our statement—if you attend a meeting at our group, you will hear the message of Alcoholics Anonymous, and if you watch us, you will see the message of Alcoholics Anonymous in action. By being a member of a group that participates in the Fifth Tradition as an activity as well as an idea, I find myself more aware of what I was taught from the beginning: The Traditions apply to my personal life as well as to my group. About a year ago I read an article by Bill W. titled "The Next Frontier: Emotional Sobriety." He wrote this article late in his AA recovery and it deals with that wonderfully terrifying realm—beyond not drinking. To me, it was the most powerful thing he ever wrote, along with the Big Book. It opened up a whole new dimension of recovery I was struggling to find. It literally saved my life. After almost three and one-half years in AA, living without my medication—alcohol—I came to a crisis in my recovery. I ended up going back to alcohol for a short period because of the pain and despair I was feeling. It was worse than anything I had experienced up to that time because I had nowhere to hide from it. My emotions were stalking me into the deepest depression of my life. I see now that I drank all those previous years to stay sane. Year by year I had become more uncomfortable emotionally even though I continued to go to four or five meetings a week, read, pray, meditate, and really work Steps One, Ten, Eleven, and Twelve. I talked constantly with my AA friends and others about how I felt. I was in a state of despair and self-condemnation for failing to "work the program." The harder I tried, the worse I felt. I could not find serenity or emotional balance. I could not figure out what was wrong and no one seemed to know what to tell me except go to meetings, read the Big Book, and get off the pity-pot. It was then that I discovered the article by Bill W. My eyes and heart and soul were opened up to that "new frontier" he had discovered after his long, agonizing, dry search through depression. I realized at once that he had suffered the same emotional devastation that I hadwhat he called an "emotional merry-go-round." He stated the problem this way: "How to translate a right mental conviction into a right emotional result, and so into easy, happy and good living.... It's the problem of life itself for all of us who have got to the point of real willingness to hew to right principles in all our affairs." There is a "point," as he calls it, where I am willing, but for some reason unable, to get past a block that prevents me from choosing to be happy and journey on into emotional sobriety. Bill W. aptly called it "a hell of a spot!" He also showed me I was dealing with my unconscious, that great expanse of old recordings which continually plays a lifetime of neglect, frustration, and fear. TAKE MY ADVICE...I'M NOT USING IT

I was feeling rather depressed and called my sponsor and found her in a similar mood. I said, "What shall I do?" At first she said, "I don't know. If you figure it out call me back." Then because she is a loving person, a good friend. and has a terrific grasp of the AA program, she shifted into sponsorship gear and told me to do the following: 1. Wear life like a loose garment. 2. Don't take myself so seriously. 3. Count my blessings. 4. Find another alcoholic to work with. 5. Read the Big Book and go to a meeting. Then she laughed and said, "Take my advice—I'm not using it." I called one of my sponsees, and she was also in a negative frame of mind. I addressed her problem and suggested one through five above. She said she had a sponsee in melancholy mood. I proposed that I and my sponsor, she and her sponsee could form a singing group called The Depressions and sing the blues. She was not amused. Later in the day my sponsor dropped by with another friend for coffee—and what a change! She's made a Twelfth Step call and taken another alcoholic to a detox. They recounted how she looked like ten miles of bad road, was ill and full of fear and remorse. Suddenly we were all full of gratitude and laughing at the insanity of self-pity and self-imposed depression. We remembered all the pain and confusion of our early days in Alcoholics Anonymous. The simplicity of this program never changes—what works is constant: trust in God, clean house, and work with others.

part of me are fears and compulsions which he calls "faulty and emotional dependencies upon people, upon AA, indeed, upon any set of circumstances whatever." This was a powerful and revealing statement about my dilemma, my recovery, and the direction I life by God was really all about. The Twelfth Step and the should now go. I was still absolutely dependent for validation and security on people (even my long dead parents) and circumstances beyond my control. This created a terrible endless spiral of self-condemnation, guilt, and depression. I began to see that my recovery was a process of growth followed by sabotage. These episodes began with a kind of innocence and newness of experience offered to me by my recovery—a pink cloud, if you will. From this new experience, I was allowed to make positive choices and responses, thus creating joy and excitement in my life. As this high peaked out, I felt the need for relief and rest. To find this relief I chose the opposite of the positive and joyous feelings. This was how I nurtured myself; it was all I had ever learned. Of course, this caused decline instead of peace and so my need for relief grew. I added other opposites and experienced more decline. Frustration and doubt began to set in. Soon I slipped into a kind of learned violence against myself for failing in my attempts to grow and nurture myself. From here it was only a short slide to depression, that gray expanse of self-hatred and self-deceit. After periods of depression, the episodes would start over again with some new experience. My absolute dependencies on people and circumstances were sabotaging my recovery with a type of self-abuse. Bill W. goes on to say that the answer is love, "an outgoing love of God's creation and his people, by means of which we avail ourselves of his love for us." He says that something very powerful must now take place if I am ever to achieve the emotional sobriety this kind of love can bring: "It is most clear that the real current can't flow until our paralyzing dependencies are broken and broken at depth." This is now the new frontier of recovery I am beginning. It is a frightening, painful, and glorious journey into freedom—a plunge into depths of emotions and feelings I had never achieved. But out of all the pain and grieving of breaking those dependencies comes a love of self and others that is beyond imagining. It is a deep and powerful Ninth Step of amends to myself and those I had so depended on. As I begin this journey of "breaking at depth," through reading, treatment, therapy, meetings, and the Twelve Steps, I am finding a healing beyond description. It is a bonding and reuniting with myself, with others, and with that inner light I call my Higher Power. Once again Bill W.'s words come to mind to guide me and help me go to any length to recover: "More and more we regard all who labor in the total field of alcoholism as our companions on a march from darkness into light. We see that we can accomplish together what we could never accomplish in separation and in rivalry." It is the wonderful searching and open-mindedness of this that has helped prevent me from suffering and the destructive recovery-robbing consequences of "contempt prior to investigation." I believe many of us AAs are entering the new frontier called emotional sobriety that Bill W. was beginning to sense and discover for himself years ago. Abstinence fro alcohol is truly only the beginning of an incredible spiritual journey into healing and joy. And I thank my Higher Power that I have Bill W. and others to travel with me.

Practice These Principles...

Tradition Five: Each group has but one primary purpose – to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

- 1. Do I ever cop out by saying, "I'm not a group, so this or that Tradition doesn't apply to me"?
- 2. Am I willing to explain firmly to a newcomer the *limitations* of AA help, even if he gets mad at me for not giving him a loan?
- 3. Have I today imposed on any AA member for a special favor or consideration simply because I am a fellow alcoholic?
- 4. Am I willing to twelfth-step the next newcomer without regard to who or what is in it for me?
- 5. Do I help my group in every way I can to fulfill our primary purpose?
- 6. Do I remember that AA old-timers, too, can be alcoholics who still suffer? Do I try both to help them and to learn from them?

SELF-SUPPORT-March, 2014

© Today in March of 2014 we have 218 Groups with 590 meetings a week. Contributions in March totaled \$4,459.66. That accounts for what 37 Groups out of 218 Groups in our area have contributed in March. This also takes into 15 AAer's who contributed \$356.92 in contributions anonymously, \$18.00 from the 3 members who contributed to the Birthday Club and the \$515.00 from the Mid Day Matinee Group who made a special contribution to help us pay for our new 2014 Quickbooks Accounting software. Our total income for March was \$11,298.77. Our Cost of Goods Sold was \$5,032.21. Subtracting the Cost of Goods Sold from our March income left us with a Gross Profit of \$6,266.56. Our Expenses for March were \$7,964.80. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of minus -\$1,698.24 for the month of March. As our AA membership continues to grow in the Tampa Bay area, the demand for more and more material and services continue to expand and we have to try and strive to keep up with the demand. That is only possible with your continued support. Thanks for all of your support !!!

NOTE TO OUR LOCAL A.A. MEMBERS:

The A.A. World Services, Inc. is pleased to announce the publication of the only authorized reproduction of the first edition of Alcoholics Anonymous.

The official publication date of the first printing of our Big Book, as noted by the United States Copyright Office, was April 10, 1939. There were 4,730 books printed, with red cloth binding, wide columns, thick paper (which was why it was called the Big Book in the first place), and a red, yellow, black and white dust jacket, which came to be known as the "circus edition" To commemorate this historic printing—and the book's 75th anniversary—the 2013 General Service Conference approved the creation of this facsimile edition, a faithful replica of the original, to be published in April 2014. This edition is published in the original English-language text only. Central Office now has copies for purchase @ \$12.00 per copy. Prices will go up July 1st to \$15.00, get your copies now!
