#### MAKE A SEARCHING AND FEARLESS INVENTORY

We have experienced a degree of peace and freedom as a result of completing Step Three. It will be easier for us to procrastinate at this point in our recovery. Some of us will have it in our minds that we can take a break after completing Step Three. Some of us might think, "What more do I need if I have God in my life?" This question is answered on page 64 of the Alcoholics Anonymous text. The literature states, "Though our decision was a vital and crucial step, it could have little permanent effect unless at once followed by a strenuous effort to face, and be rid of, the things in ourselves which have been blocking us. Our liquor was but a symptom. So we had to get down to causes and conditions." Completing the Third Step prayer will only keep us sober for a temporary time. We will need to complete the remaining Steps if we want to experience continual peace and sobriety, so it is vital that we complete our Fourth Step Inventory if we want to remain sober. The Fourth Step will help us identify our defects of character and how these defects hurt others and ourselves. We will gain insight into our defects of character by identifying the situations and conditions that provoked us to practice them. "The Seven Deadly Sins" is a good guide for identifying what a defect of character is. They include pride, greed, lust, envy, gluttony, wrath, and sloth. We will be able to better identify our own defects of character with this knowledge. There three sections of the Fourth Step inventory that the A.A. text specifically addresses. They are fear, resentment, and sex. However, we will want to inventory any area of our lives in which we practice our defects of character. We are no longer avoiding the truth. Many of us have been dodging the truth for years, if not all our lives. We were afraid of what the truth might reveal to us about ourselves. We knew we had to face our truth regardless of our feelings. If we tried to skip this Step, we paid for it in the form of an eventual relapse or a less predictable emotional state. We will not want to miss the tool of honest self-investigation that the Fourth Step offers us. We will continue to use to use this tool on a daily basis after we have completed Step Four. We are slowly learning how to be our authentic selves. And we will do this with the assurance and support of our Higher Power and the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous. We do not have to hide from ourselves anymore. If we have completed our Fourth Step inventory, we have completed what most people in the world are afraid to do. We have faced ourselves and have grown because of it. We can now move on to Step Five. We have found it best to complete the Fifth Step as soon as possible after completing the Fourth Step inventory. ## THE OPPORTUNITY TO DO BETTER

When I was new to AA, one of my favorite meetings to attend was a Tuesday night women's meeting. It wasn't my home group, but it was one of my favorite meetings. It was a closed meeting, but they let me bring my 4-year-old daughter with me. They had a group conscience to allow children. I told my sponsor all about this meeting and how much I liked it. When I got six months of sobriety, it happened to be on a Tuesday. My sponsor came with me to this women's meeting to give me my six-month coin. Because it was her first time visiting this meeting, I asked her afterward how she liked it. She said it seemed like a nice meeting, but she looked a little bit confused. She asked me if she had heard right when they were reading the script and said that the meeting was closed. I confirmed that, yes, that was one of the reasons I felt comfortable in the meeting. Then she asked why I was bringing my daughter to a closed meeting. I explained to her that they allow everyone to bring their kids and that it was a group conscience decision made by the members. That's when I first learned a lot more about Tradition Four. My sponsor took the time that evening to explain to me what a closed meeting is for. She explained that even though I don't personally choose to hide my anonymity, there are some members who need their anonymity to be protected. Some professionals can't risk running into their patients or clients. School teachers, pediatricians and counselors, among others, may actually need that meeting to be closed. And while I'm free to attend any meeting I like -open or closed- some members are only able to attend closed meetings. They depend on being able to look for that word "closed" in the AA meeting directory, knowing their anonymity will be protected. My sponsor told me that I don't have the right to risk someone else's anonymity by bringing my daughter to a closed meeting, no matter what their group conscience says. She explained that in our "Twelve and Twelve" book, in the chapter about Tradition Four, it states that every group has the "right to be wrong," and in this case she thought the group was wrong. She told me that once I know better I have the opportunity to do better, just like in any other inventory work. More is always revealed. I stopped attending that meeting on the nights that I had my daughter. Coincidentally, my daughter started school the very next year, and you'll never guess how she knew the in-training principal. Yes, from the "closed" women's meeting. I felt terrible, but the principal was very gracious and understanding. Since then, I have a much deeper respect for all the Traditions. I also have a better understanding of the Fourth Tradition in that it was never intended to be used to void any of the other Traditions. The Traditions were meant to work together in unit, not against each other. One Tradition doesn't cancel another one out. Each group is autonomous in their own customs and practices, not their own Steps and Traditions. Does the group want to clap or chant? Should the meeting be an hour or an hour and a half long? How much money should the group keep for a prudent reserve? Does the group Contributions to Central Office through PayPal. give out coins at the beginning of the meeting or the end of the meeting or not at all? Each group should have their own formats and their own customs. But the 12 Traditions are the same for every group. And if my home group is breaking a Tradition, we are effecting AA as a whole, because that's what we're passing on to new people—our future oldtimers.

TBAIC SECRETARY REPORT 24/03/09 Chair Report - The meeting started at 9:30 AM with the Declaration of Unity. In attendance were John T., Joe R., Jenna M., Jonathan C., Mike B. and Tom F. Jonathan started his report by saying the district asked him to do some background on a proposed literature change on the 24th of March, regarding singleness of purpose. He went on to say that there would be two district meetings in March and none in April due to schedule conflicts the assembly and the Easter Holiday. He also reported that the Carry the Message Day will be held on April 20th at the Salvation Army Church on Sligh Ave between 1:00 PM and 4:00 PM. Secretary Report - Tom F then read the secretary report and it was accepted as read without any changes to it. Treasurer Report -John T. presented the treasurers' report. Our current balance is \$3,320.13. Monthly expenses were \$50.00 for Central Office Storage, \$47.03 Zephyrhills CI coffee. Literature expenses for the month totaled \$339.30. All meetings at ACTS Amethyst are currently being covered. Meetings at Cove Housing (women) are not currently being covered John called to ask about starting again but has not been able to connect with them. Acts Juvenile is going well. The men's meetings at Cove Behavioral Heath are going well according to Joe R.. Sandra Prince is also doing well according to John R. Tom F. reported Wellspring is not supporting the HCA West Tampa Hospital on Webb Road since the hospital closed down their detox center. Corrections – True Core Juvenile, the girl's side is going well according to Jenna M. She also noted that the facility is going to start meetings for boys at the facility. Women's meetings in Hillsborough County are going well. There was no report for the men's meetings in Hillsborough County Jails. No report for women at Pasco County Jail. Tom F. reported things were a bit sticky at Zephyrhills CI. They recently cut down on the number of cups we are allowed to pass out to 35 while we have been getting more than that number attending the meeting each week. They seem to be going out their way to discourage participation at the meeting. Tom F. is going to write to the DOC program director as well as the officials at Zephyrhills CI. Bridge The Gap – Bridge the Gap we had one call John T. Handled it. Man on the Bed – Tom F. reported that he had two calls for MOB, one for a female patient and one call for a male patient. ## LISTEN TO LEARN-LEARN TO LISTEN

One of the greatest acts we can perform is to teach another human being how to discover their true potential by showing them how to work the Steps and to live life on life's terms. No doubt you have experienced the sense of fulfillment that comes when you've helped someone. Unfortunately, our ability to be teachers often gets entangled with our agenda and we turn into preachers. We start to gain some insights into the way the program works and then the next thing you know, we're experts at everything. We used to share for a few minutes at a meeting but now we head off into a 15 or 20 minute speech and still have to double or even triple dip with even more of our great wisdom and knowledge. There's an old Indian saying, "Thunder is loud but lightening gets the job done." Maybe, perhaps, we need to focus more on being teachers and not preachers by focusing on what we need to fix, instead of looking at what's wrong with others. When we are walking the talk, people feel it. They notice that we are changing and that's what will help them the most. They'll want to know what our secret to sobriety is and that curiosity will build the desire for them to open up. A great tool to use is to become a better listener. We need to feel people at the level that they'll coming from if we want them to hear us. The only way to do that is to listen to them. For many of us our first response is to talk. The truth is, when someone comes to us for advice, they don't really want advice. What they want is a sounding board, a medium for them to sort out their jumbled thoughts so they can get down to the answers they already possess. So a good exercise to increase your listening skills is to avoid interrupting. When you're talking with someone, fight the urge to take front-stage. Don't try to teach them anything. Just be silent, and if the person asks for feedback, paraphrase back to them what they told you without making judgments or giving advice. You will see that the person wants to share more with you and you in turn will learn more about what the person needs. Learn to pay less attention to what goes in your mouth and more attention to what comes out. Sometimes we are so quick to give advice that we don't realize how powerful our words are. We can easily send someone in the wrong direction by saying the wrong thing. Imagine yourself telling someone how to invest in a million dollars. Most likely, you'll give a lot more thought to what you're saying. Ask yourself often, "am I sure this is what this person needs to hear?" If you keep doing that, you will soon see dramatic improvements in your ability to teach others. **Anonymous** 



## **Tradition Four March 1948**

Tradition Four March 1948 Tradition Four is a specific application of general principles already outlined in Traditions One and Two. Tradition One states: "Each member of Alcoholics Anonymous is but a small part of a great whole. AA must continue to live or most of us will surely die. Hence our common welfare comes first. But individual welfare follows close afterward." Tradition Two states: "For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority—a loving God as he may express himself in our group conscience." With these concepts in mind, let us look more closely at Tradition Four. The first sentence guarantees each AA group local autonomy. With respect to its own affairs, the group may make any decisions, adopt any attitudes that it likes. No overall or intergroup authority should challenge this primary privilege. We feel this ought to be so, even though the group might sometimes act with complete indifference to our Tradition. For example, an AA group could, if it wished, hire a paid preacher and support him out of the proceeds of a group nightclub. Though such an absurd procedure would be miles outside our Tradition, the group's "right to be wrong" would be held inviolate. We are sure that each group can be granted, and safely granted, these most extreme privileges. We know that our familiar process of trial and error would summarily eliminate both the preacher and the nightclub. Those severe growing pains which invariably follow any radical departure from AA Tradition can be absolutely relied upon to bring an erring group back into line. An AA group need not be coerced by any human government over and above its own members. Their own experience, plus AA opinion in surrounding groups, plus God's prompting in their group conscience would be sufficient. Much travail has already taught us this. Hence we may confidently say to each group, "You should be responsible to no other authority than your own conscience." Yet please note one important qualification. It will be seen that such extreme liberty of thought and action applies only to the group's own affairs. Rightly enough, this Tradition goes on to say, "But when its plans concern the welfare of neighboring groups also, these groups ought to be consulted." Obviously, if any individual, group, or regional committee could take an action that might seriously affect the welfare of Alcoholics Anonymous as a whole or seriously disturb surrounding groups, that would not be liberty at all. It would be sheer license; it would be anarchy, not democracy. Therefore, we AAs have universally adopted the principle of consultation. This means that if a single AA group wishes to take any action that might affect surrounding groups, it consults them. Or, it confers with the intergroup committee for the area, if there be one. Likewise, if a group or regional committee wishes to take any action that might affect AA as a whole, it consults the trustees of the Alcoholic Foundation, who are, in effect, our overall general service committee. For instance, no group or intergroup could feel free to initiate, without consultation, any publicity that might affect AA as a whole. Nor could it assume to represent the whole of Alcoholics Anonymous by printing and distributing anything purporting to be AA standard literature. This same principle would naturally apply to all similar situations. Though there is no formal compulsion to do so, all undertakings of this general character are customarily checked with our AA general Headquarters. This idea is clearly summarized in the last sentence of Tradition Four, which observes, "On such issues common welfare is paramount." Excerpts: "The Language of the Heart"

## SELF-SUPPORT-March, 2024

© Today in March, 2024 still COVID has changed the way many groups contribute to the Central Office. Some groups have remained steady in their contributions, some groups have gone to ZOOM, A few ZOOM groups have made some contributions and some groups are Hybrid (in-person & ZOOM), other groups have folded for a lack of a space to have their meeting and some new groups are starting up, and now many groups are getting back to normal pre-pandemic live meetings. Things are looking up and getting better. It's certainly a time to renew our efforts and practice the meaning of the Serenity Prayer a little bit more. We currently have 191 Groups in the Hillsborough-East Pasco area with around 502 meetings weekly. Also we have 128 Zoom meetings weekly Contributions in March totaled \$4,574.21. This accounts for what 37 Groups or Individuals in our area have contributed in March, also included is, \$884.01 from 6 Groups or Individuals who made contributions through PayPal. Our literature sales for March was \$4,652.84. This includes sales from A.A. material and non-A.A. material (medallions—etc.). Our total income for March was \$9,227.05. Our Total Cost of Goods Sold was \$3,643.06. Subtracting the Total Cost of Goods Sold from our March income left us with a Gross Profit of \$5,583.99. Our Total Expenses for March were \$11,516.00. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of minus-\$5,932.01 for the month of March. We still have a good Prudent Reserve, all our bills keep getting paid, the lights are on, we have a decent amount of literature available, the phones are working Thank you for your support. Thank You!!!O.M. tws:)

These questions were originally published in the AA Grapevine in conjunction with a series on the Twelve Traditions that began in November 1969 and ran through September 1971. (The 12 Traditions were created to help each A.A. group maintain unity and relate better to the world about us. Below is a snapshot inventory you can take to see how well you are honoring the spiritual principle found in this Tradition Four: Each Group should be Tradition.) autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or AA as a whole. 1. Do I insist that there are only a few right ways of doing things in A.A.? 2. Does my group always consider the welfare of the rest of AA? Of nearby groups? Of Loners in Alaska? Of Internationalists miles from port? Of a group in Rome or El Salvador? 3. Do I put down other members' behavior when it is different from mine, or do I learn from it? 4. Do I always bear in mind that, to those outsiders who know who I am in AA, I may to some extent represent our entire beloved Fellowship? 5. Am I willing to help a newcomer go to any lengths—his lengths, not mine—to stay sober? 6. Do I share my knowledge of AA tools with other members who may not have heard of them?

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Continue to watch for selfishness, dishonesty, resentment, and fear. When these crop up, we ask God at once to remove them. We discuss them with someone immediately and make amends quickly if we have harmed anyone. Then we resolutely turn our thoughts to someone we can help. Love and tolerance of others is our code. 
