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Are We a Debating Society?

Why do we need a “forum for debate” in Alcoholics Anonymous? Has AA really become a debating society? There was once another group of alcoholics who had much success at helping drunks recover. Many of you know about the Washingtonians. Back in the 1840s they helped hundreds of thousands achieve sobriety. They, too, had one primary purpose—to help the alcoholic who was still suffering. Their program worked. Then they decided to introduce some secondary purposes into their movement. The membership couldn't agree on what these secondary purposes should be. Some thought this, some thought that. Their fellowship started arguing with itself. Unity was gone and pretty soon so was the Washingtonian movement. If we don't learn from history are we doomed to repeat it? Some say yes. In our book, *As Bill Sees It*, Bill said, “Though many of us had to struggle for sobriety, never yet has this Fellowship had to struggle for lost unity. Consequently, we sometimes take this one great gift for granted. We forget that should we lose our unity, the millions of alcoholics who still ‘do not know’ might never get their chance.” From the 1840s to the 1930s millions of alcoholics didn't have a chance because of the failed unity of the Washingtonians. The articles in the Grapevine under the heading “Is AA Changing?” suggest to me that we have a serious unity problem within our Fellowship—member debating against member, in print, in our “meeting in print.” Where has all this confusion come from? Have our Traditions, our very name become obsolete? Our early members, through trial and error and a lot of pain, laid down a set of spiritual principles called the Twelve Traditions so the future generations of AA would not have to go through the same difficult process of finding out what was best for the Fellowship. Let's look at our name. It isn't complicated. Alcoholics Anonymous. It states what we are. Our Preamble is very clear on our purpose, on what we do and what we do not do. And the Traditions—how well they cover what AA is and what AA is not, how we relate within the Fellowship and how we relate to the outside world. We can also refer to *AA Comes of Age*, which explains in depth the history of our three legacies of Recovery, Unity, and Service. Do we need to reinvent the wheel? Can our Fellowship survive a major unity break? Would we be able to regroup and get our unity back or would we go the way of the Washingtonians? I do not believe that any one member sets out to destroy AA. Most Tradition breaks occur because members want to improve AA, make it better, more up to date, to keep it moving along in this changing world. But it is our ignorance of what AA really is that is tearing our unity apart. What are the main unity problems that we are hearing throughout our Fellowship today? Some are “How do we introduce ourselves?” and “What do we talk about at a meeting?” No one is trying to hurt AA by introducing themselves as an “alcoholic and addict.” Many of these people are just doing what we tell them to do—get honest—and then we turn around and say don't say this and don't say that! Just introduce yourself as *this*

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Freedom from Alcohol

Somewhat over thirty-four years ago, I came to the Fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous. I was sick, hurting, angry, and afraid. I remember so well the first meetings, and how I had to sit on my hands trying to control the shaking—how these people came to me, put their hands on my shoulder, and said, “Don't worry, it's going to be all right.” Then they took me aside and said, “We know something you don't know because we have been through it, but if you will do the things we say and accept our help, you will never find it necessary to take another drink.” Then they sat me down and talked about themselves and got me to tell a little bit about me. As we sat and talked back and forth, I soon found that I was the same as them, had been through the same things, been in the same places, hurt myself and others the same way. I thought, “My God, I'm never going to need another drink,” and to this date that has proven to be true. I am grateful that my sponsor was a person who was very well versed in the content of the Big Book and a man who firmly believed in the duties of a sponsor. What this man passed on to me was an understanding of the requirements of sobriety, not the cork in the bottle type we hear so much about, but the real sobriety that comes from practicing the program as it appears in the Big Book—the program that formed the basis of sobriety for our early members and worked so very well for so many years in the Fellowship. Today, however, such is not always the case. Many times new members are simply left to float aimlessly around the meetings, without ever really finding out about the true nature of their illness and more importantly, about recovery. They aren't given the opportunity to share in the program as it really and they aren't given the essential tools for change necessary for permanent sobriety. The problem is further aggravated by the infiltration into meetings of material from programs dealing with non-addictive problems—programs dealing with child abuse, codependency, and other hang-ups. These programs have absolutely nothing to do with sobriety, and as a matter of fact often go in a direction away from the principles of the Twelve Steps. Is it any wonder many of the newcomers are confused, particularly when these things are being brought in by members with some degree of sobriety who should know better? So where does the problem lie? The Big Book hasn't changed. The program in the Big Book hasn't changed. What has changed is that the message being transmitted at many meetings doesn't accurately reflect the principles of our primary purpose and the message we are asked to carry in our Twelfth Step, the message of having had a spiritual awakening as *the* result of working the Steps. All right then, what is the solution? There isn't any sense running from pillar to post, ranting and raving about how AA is going to hell in a hand basket, because all that happens is the creation of a lot of doubt and unrest. But there are things that can be done. As an individual I can't control many of the things that are changing but I can help ensure that if there are changes, they will be positive. For example, in a garden we

Ruth N. has 3 new volunteers to help with the meetings at the E. Pasco County women's facility. The new program director inquired about meetings at the men's facility. Since the men's facility is outside TBAIC's area, Ruth will check with the coordinator from that area about coverage for the men's facility and to offer our assistance if needed.

Jim S. received one call for Bridge the Gap requesting information. He received an email from Anita for four possible Bridge the Gap rides next week.

In new business, since TBAIC is no longer on District 2's website, Jim S. found that it would cost approximately \$300.00 per year to maintain a website that would be dedicated to TBAIC only. Sylvia L. volunteered to assist in publishing the website and will gather ideas on what information should be on the website. She would also be able to include an area available only to committee members, accessed by a password.

Jim S. also mentioned that Soberstock could use some volunteers from TBAIC.

Buddy H. is planning on putting together another softball tournament, in early May, if he is able to get a permit issued by the county. The cost would be \$100.00 per team, the same as last year.

ACTS (Drew Park Amethyst Respite Center) is requiring volunteers to have at least one year of sobriety. The facility is also discontinuing the 10:30 am meeting. The one year sobriety requirement is for all ACTS facilities.

Susan O. gave a quick overview of the topics covered at the recent district assembly meeting in Sarasota. The next assembly meeting will be in St. Petersburg.

and don't talk about *that!* In the beginning of sobriety the emphasis is on "I." I have to say thus and so because I have to remind myself of who and what I am. I can say what I want because I'm important and I have to help me. How do we get beyond the "I" into "we"? It happens when we start getting into the Traditions and find that "we" are just a small part of a larger picture, that our personal recovery depends upon AA as a whole. The Traditions lead us out of our self-centered "I" program into the whole of AA. We are shown that we must conform and why. They show us what is at stake. We see this is *not* a selfish program, in the sense of selfishness and self-centeredness. The "I" does have a part in insuring that AA is still around for the generations to come. For that, I am responsible. Tradition Five seems to be getting the most workout lately. This Tradition states that "each group has but one primary purpose—to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers." But what is our message today? Many meetings have turned into an extension of aftercare programs. We discuss anything under the sun, from "getting in touch with our feelings" to how abused we were as children, from co-dependence to poly-addictions. What is the AA message that we have to offer the alcoholic? Dr. Bob said it so well in his farewell message, when he emphasized "the simplicity of our program." Dr. Bob said, "Let's not louse it up with Freudian complexes and things that are interesting to the scientific mind, but have very little to do with our actual AA work." We share our recovery, through the working of the Twelve Steps with the newly sober alcoholic. What happens to singleness of purpose when we introduce ourselves with all our other addictions tacked on? We open the door to talk about the other addictions. If one alcoholic walks through our doors only to leave because he or she cannot identify with the members sitting around talking about *all* addictions, then we have *failed*. We are no longer AA and we need to close shop. We keep hearing that a drug is a drug, that alcohol is mentioned only in the First Step, that we are really talking about feelings, that all addicts have the same feelings. Yet the very beginning of recovery for each of us is one drunk talking to another. This is the whole foundation of our program. Without that moment of identification, there is no recovery. Through learning about the Traditions, we go beyond our own wants and needs and learn to fit into the whole of AA. A whole other spiritual world begins to unfold. The reasons for giving up one's self become clear when we start the journey toward the self-sacrifice and humility that is the spiritual foundation of our entire recovery. Then we can becoming of maximum service to God and to our fellow man and anything is possible—even unity!

remove or control undesirable weeds; in my personal sobriety, I remove the things that have been blocking me; and in my home group, by means of group inventory, I do something about the things that cause problems. At the group level, this might mean: 1) ensuring that the message being presented today is as good as the message that was here when we first needed it; 2) seeing to it that everyone coming through the door is given the chance to hear firsthand exactly what it is all about from persons with quality sobriety; and 3) making it known that a group is not interested in all this outside gobbledygook that has nothing to do with sobriety. We can't be all things to all people, so let's do the thing we do best and that is carry the message of recovery from alcohol. By being knowledgeable about our singleness of purpose, we can do much to help our group and AA as a whole. We can avoid the pitfalls that caused the demise of several other well-intentioned entities that started off with the aim of helping alcoholics, but failed because they drifted from their primary purpose. It would be beneficial for everyone to realize that AA can only last as long as it remains "a fellowship of men and women who share their experience, strength, and hope with each other that they may solve their *common problem* and help others to *recover from alcoholism*." Perhaps the following from a piece of AA literature would help as well: "Sobriety—freedom from alcohol—through the teaching and practice of the Twelve Steps, is the sole purpose of an AA group."



SELF-SUPPORT-January, 2016

© Today in January of 2016 we have 218 Groups with 576 meetings a week. Contributions in January totaled \$6,282.33. That accounts for what 55 Groups out of 218 Groups in our area have contributed in January. This also takes into account the \$49.00 from the 3 members who contributed to the Birthday Club and the \$740.00 collected from Ticket Sales for our upcoming Anniversary Dinner. Our total income for January was \$15,053.52. Our Cost of Goods Sold was \$6,121.35. Subtracting the Cost of Goods Sold from our January income left us with a Gross Profit of \$8,932.17. Our Total Expenses for January were \$8,941.12. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of minus --\$8.95 for the month of January. As our AA membership continues to grow in the Tampa Bay area, the demand for more and more material and services continue to expand and we have to try and strive to keep up with the demand. That is only possible with your continued support. Thank you for all of your support !!!




