1967-1977: The Challenge to AA

The challenge of the next ten years is to extend the hand of AA to anyone, anywhere who seeks help for alcoholic problems. To meet this challenge, we must make sure this hand is strong, warm, welcoming, and ready with the best that AA is and can become. This is the star we have hitched our wagon—the commitment which was made when AA was young, and the commitment we reaffirmed in Toronto. There will be clouds that will get between us and that star: differences of opinion, arguments, some of them heated and angry, challenges from within and without, criticisms, misunderstandings. Even praise and appreciation can blur our vision. Other stars can divert us, or stop us part way to the goal of sobriety—sobriety built soundly on the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions. So our first challenge is to keep clearly in mind that without happy sobriety we have nothing, and that to stay happily sober we must pass it on to those who still suffer. Let nothing divert us from this purpose. Let us use our best wits to find and develop more effective ways to attract and hold the millions of alcoholics whom AA has not yet reached effectively. Put another way, this says, “Only a fraction of alcoholics—possibly only five percent—become successful in AA.” I do not know how this figure was derived, or where the observation was made. It was made by one who is not unsympathetic to AA. Whether or not it is accurate, we know that there are many who need AA whom we are not reaching, that there are some who turn away after a meeting or two, that there are some who, after months or years of active membership, drift away. This has been, is now, and will continue to be our big job. Let us then examine ways that can be used to bring our beloved program to more suffering alcoholics.

1—Should we not be publishing literature that will reach those who for some reason read little or not at all? The comic-book pamphlet, published this year, is a trial balloon. If it is successful, there may be other pamphlets of this sort. In any event, knowing as we do that relatively few of these people who have had little of the advantages of life have been successful in AA, we must find better ways of carrying the message to them. With the courts in several states ruling that public intoxication on the part of a chronic alcoholic is not a crime, and that these people should not be treated as criminals, but as sick people—we may have a better chance to help. Certainly, we will be needed even more than now.

2—Should we be doing more to help the professional in the field of alcoholism? As governments—state, Federal, and local—are forced by these court decisions to develop treatment programs, many more professionals will become interested and involved. Some of them will have positive ideas that may not agree with ours. Others will be unwilling to go even a little bit beyond the call of duty. Most will be as anxious as we are to help the suffering alcoholics and their families, and are thrilled as we are when recovery begins. So we must improve our working relationships with the professionals in medicine and social work, and with the clergy. We have talked

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12 TIPS FOR SOBER HOLIDAYS

1. **Line up extra AA activities (help on the phones, speak, empty the ashtrays).**
2. **Be host to friends, especially newcomers, at home or at a coffee shop.**
3. **Keep your AA telephone list with you at all times.**
4. **Find out about holiday meetings or celebrations in your local groups.**
5. **Skip any drinking occasions you’re nervous about.**
6. **If there’s one you can’t skip, take an AA friend—or keep candy handy.**

9. **Don’t sit around brooding; catch up on reading, museums, walks, letters.**
10. **Don’t project about holiday temptations: remember “One day at a time.”**
11. **Even if you cannot give material gifts, enjoy the beauty of holiday love.**
12. **Carry the message. Give the joy away, and it will be yours to keep.**

SELF-PITY

Around the tables, long ago, I noted the veterans who were happy in their sobriety rarely fixed a discussion group’s attention on their problems. Instead, these happy “elders” (whether sixty-one or twenty-one) focused on the “dealing with” aspect of problems. They didn’t go into the difficulties these things were causing in their lives. They said, in effect, “We use these inconveniences to grow by developing solutions.” As time and AA worked their wonders on me, I found more and more that self-pity was directly related to straying from AA principles. If I felt sorry for myself, I knew I was not practicing the Steps. Today, when the inward voice begins to wail, “How can this happen to me?,” I put Step Ten into high gear, for I know there is something wrong and I had better promptly admit it. In the manner of those veterans, I now use the first sign of self-pity to advantage, for I recognize that it is but a short way from “poor me” to a drink. Therefore, rather than wallowing in self-pity, I get busy in AA, and quick as a wink, the wretched feeling is gone. This way, maybe, I will one day be a happy elder.....

The October 14th, 2017 meeting of TBAIC was opened by Susan O.; leading the "Serenity Prayer".

Linn D. (Treasurer) distributed/reviewed the Treasurer's Report and contributions expenses. It was noted that there were no expenses for the month of September and that any surplus funds are being used to keep a reserve of literature stocked. There was a motion to approve Treasurer's report; group approved. A concern was brought to Linn's (Treasurer) attention regarding the cost of literature and the amount (specifically the little Big Books) being left at meetings. Suggestion from the group is that prudence be used when providing Big Books at meetings i.e., perhaps provide if requested by an individual vs. leaving behind one for each person in attendance, etc...

Sara R. (Hillsborough Women's Jails) - Indicated that meetings are going well and that she has had recent inquiries by new people to possibly lead meetings.

Allen D., on behalf of Scott R. (Detox & Treatment), indicated that Drew Park (Amethyst) now requires that they copy the ids of individuals entering the facility to lead a meeting. Also, ACTS (on Henry) has a 1-year requirement going forward. And lastly, Northside has two open meetings if anyone is available to fill.

Tom F., on behalf of Chris D. (E. Pasco Prison), indicated that the Big Book study at the Zephyrhills facility is being well received and has a consistent turnout.

Amanda L. (Women's Bridge the Gap Coordinator) indicated that there had been 1-call received. Ride was offered; not taken advantage of by person requesting. Amanda also indicated that an additional female has volunteered to provide rides.

Tom F. (Men's Bridge the Gap Coordinator) indicated that there had been 3-calls received; 2-provided, 1-ride offered and not taken advantage of by person requesting.

Allan D. highlighted Amanda's contribution at the recent Carry the Message Day Event. Indicated that Amanda did a great job speaking to the TBAIC display and took the time to speak with each person that stopped to review the display. In addition, Allen suggested that we may want to update the display going forward to ensure current. He and Amanda L. will work on this going forward and present options back to the group.

much in the past about AA's need for the understanding and moral support of physicians and clergy. Bill long ago used the picture of the three-legged milking stool to illustrate this. When any of us tries to do the whole job alone, parts of it are likely to be done badly, and we make cooperation difficult or impossible. We may well hurt those whom we are trying to help. I recently learned of a new member—a month in AA—who had had a heart attack and was taking the medicine that he needed for the pains that came with exertion or excitement. A well-meaning AA member told him to stop taking the pills—that he would get drunk if he continued taking them. He was afraid to go to meetings in case he might have heart pains—and afraid to stay away from meetings because he needed AA. To tell a patient who is taking medication prescribed by a competent physician to stop taking it, or change the dose, or take something else, may probably hurt the patient. It will destroy any friendship that physician may have for AA, as this he would rightly consider irresponsible meddling. I have urged many AAs to identify themselves to the physicians and clergymen who knew them as practicing alcoholics. Several have told me of the change in attitude that has occurred, which in some instances has opened hospital doors. We shall need to do much, much more of this, as more and more government-supported treatment facilities are established. The development of a smooth and effective working relationship will not be easy. It will require a lot of tolerance on their part and on ours. It will require understanding—deep understanding and respect of each other as individuals, so that we can talk through our differences, learning from each other—recognizing and accepting our own limitations and each other's strengths. We, officially, cannot enter into any formal relationship. As individuals, we are needed, provided that we will understand and respect the province of the professionals, and accept their knowledge and competence in that province, at the same time that we offer our help and show our results. 3—Should we not rededicate ourselves to helping the growth of worldwide AA? The spread of AA around the world has been exciting. The need for translations of our literature into other languages has confirmed us in our belief that AA is real—that the AA way of life is universally true. Yet AA has had, and still has, its problems in some parts of the world. We cannot successfully impose our ways on another culture, any more than we can impose our ideas on another person. We can only attract, giving advice and encouragement when we are asked, as we learn to communicate with the language of the heart. 4—Should we not present AA as “attractively” as we can to the public? Can we not improve both the breadth and depth of our approach, and that of our public-information committees? We have been unbelievably fortunate in the understanding and support of the communications media—the people of press, radio, and TV. Willing and anxious to help, to use our material, they have yet been willing to give up the human-interest stories which are such a large part of their stock in trade. We are most grateful. We must show our gratitude and do all that we possibly can to keep their understanding and knowledge of AA true and vital. 5—Can we not strengthen our official interpretation of AA at professional meetings? The International Congress to be held in Washington in 1968 is a case in point. Exhibits—other than visual aids—meetings—personal contacts—presentation

of talks—these are some of the ways in which we can develop interest and understanding among those whom we need and who need us. 6—Are there ways to be used to strengthen our communications between present and past General Service Delegates, the General Service Trustees, and the groups? Many of us feel, I am sure, that there isn't enough of us to go around. But let us all use Box 4-5-9, the Grapevine, and all the other ways open to us to keep in touch. Conferences are high spots for all of us. All of this and more will happen if we as individuals live by the program—one day at a time—recognizing the personal pitfalls of halo-polishing, overconfidence, taking the other fellow's inventory rather than our own, resentment, self-pity, and the other traps we know so well. If I have seemed to confuse the challenges of AA as a whole with the challenges to each of us as individuals, it is because of my conviction that the two cannot be separated. What people think and do about AA is made up of what people think about you and me, and the way we have lived the program. Remember the story* of the AA who talked at a meeting for professionals in a hospital and after the meeting introduced herself to the physician who had treated her before she found AA? That doctor sponsored a group in that hospital, and goodness knows how many alcoholics are now recovering as a result of that contact. A convinced professional friend is made for AA. On the other hand, a well-meaning AA persuades a new member under treatment by a friendly physician to stop taking that treatment. The result: There may be no more referrals to AA from *that* physician. When some of us breaks the anonymity of another, not maliciously but carelessly, AA is hurt. When we, as individuals, live the program with the best guidance we can get in the Eleventh Step, AA is strengthened. If, *as a movement*, we live by the Second Tradition, we will meet all the challenges that may come our way: For our group purpose there is one ultimate authority...a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience...

SELF-SUPPORT-October 2017

© Today in October of 2017 we have 224 Groups with 565 meetings a week. Contributions in October totaled \$ 3,221.06. That accounts for what 46 Groups out of 224 Groups in our area have contributed in October. Our total income for October was \$7,059.16. Our Cost of Goods Sold was \$3,888.81. Subtracting the Cost of Goods Sold from our October income left us with a Gross Profit of \$8,417.32. Our Total Expenses for October were \$8,351.45. 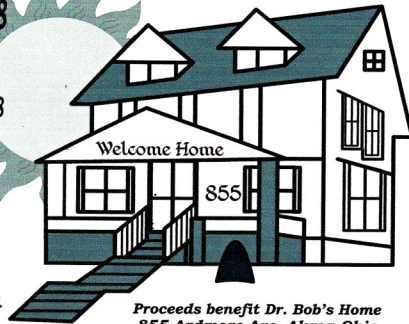
